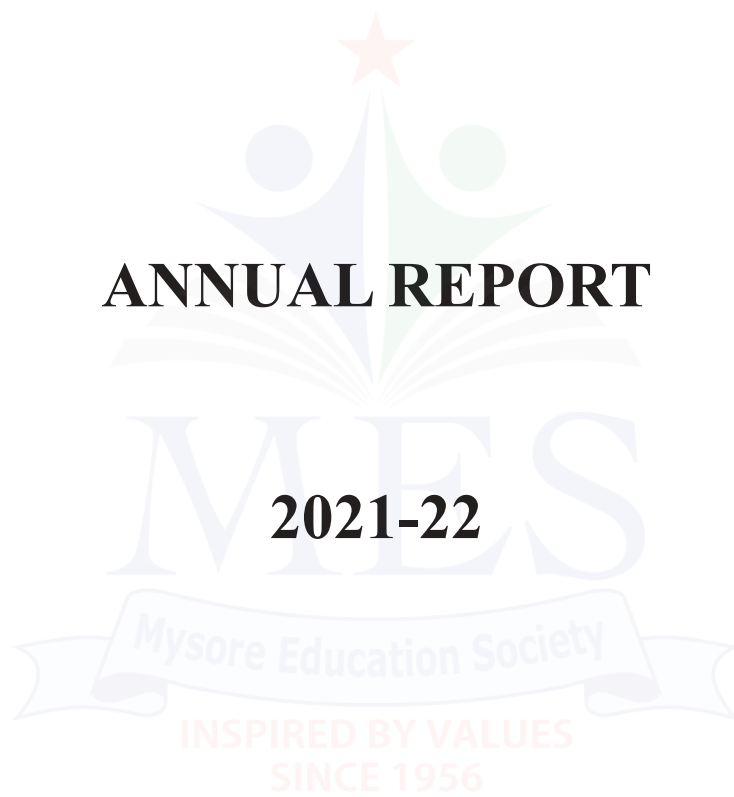

Chapter 1 Enrolment

Overview

Enrolment in all the MES institutions has been declining. The broad trends are highlighted below.

- ❖ In our schools at Malleswaram and Vidyananyapura, practically all the seats on offer are being taken up. In Malleswaram, some twenty to thirty high school seats have gone unfilled in the last two years.
- ❖ Enrolment in our four PU Colleges has fallen from 3321 in 2021-21 to 3293 in 2021-22, a drop of 0.84% over the year 2020-21. Enrolment at MPL PU College has fallen by 15.45% in 2021-22, followed by ACS PU College (1.58%). Enrolment in BRS PU has increased by 16.48% and there is no change in KKPU.
- ❖ UG Enrolment have not fared well either. Enrolment to the BA program at MES ACS College have hovered from 240 in 2020-21 to 229 in 2021-22, although five times that number of seats are sanctioned by the Bangalore Central University (BCU).
- ❖ Compared to BA, BSc programs have done better. However, Enrolment which averaged 62% in 2020-21, dropped to 50% in 2021-22.
- ❖ B. Com remains our flagship program. At MES College, demand for seats has been sustained and in the last two years, an average of 94% of the seats available have been filled. At IOM, the average has been 81%.
- ❖ BBA has become a popular program at IOM, with the enrolment percentage remaining the same at 91% both in 2020-21 and 2021-22.
- ❖ Of the two PG programs, the demand for Mathematics which had seen a drop in 2020-21 revived in 2021-22 with 74% of the seats being filled. The PG program in Kannada has seen a stable, but low demand, with an average of 35% of the seats on offer being taken.

The decline in the demand for seats in the PU Colleges is due to the inroads made by the so-called Integrated Colleges which are in reality tuition centres passing off as colleges. The Department of Pre-University Education (DPUE) needs to take a realistic stance on allowing these institutions to flourish at the expense of mainstream PU colleges. If good UG education demands qualifying through

entrance examinations, then it is not surprising that the students prefer institutions that can give them the knowledge as well as coach them for such examinations. DPUE must take note of this trend and permit regular PU colleges to offer coaching classes to students who want them, subject to certain broad guidelines. Unless this is done, there is a real danger of conventional PU colleges and PU education itself being hollowed out.

At the UG level, other factors are at work. The message coming through is that courses that offer better job opportunities are preferred by students and parents. This explains the popularity of the B. Com and BBA programs. BSc programs in stand-alone UG colleges seem to be losing out to higher educational institutions as well as Autonomous & Deemed Universities offering even better programs. BA programs seem to attract only aspirants for the civil services and other competitive examinations. National Education Policy (NEP), 2020 has added to the confusion with its “Two Disciplines + One Optional Elective” model that has been rolled out by the Bangalore Central University (BCU) without adequate clarity and preparation. UG enrolments in colleges without PG departments and a research orientation may suffer in the near term, till such colleges reinvent themselves as envisaged in NEP 2020.

Data on enrolment is presented in Table 1.1

Category-wise Enrolment

Data on category-wise enrolment for the last two years i.e., 2020-21 and 2021-22 is at Table 1.2. Enrolment of students belonging to Scheduled Castes (SC) and Tribes (ST) has been remarkably stable at a shade under 1,000 and 200 respectively. In percentage terms, this works out to around 10% and 2% respectively. In the coming years, data on the enrolment of students belonging to the OBC category will also be culled out and analysed separately.

Gender Balance

KKPS has maintained an even balance between girls and boys during 2020-21 and 2021-22, while in KK, the ratio is more like 49:51. The four PU Colleges have a 50:50 presence of girls and boys in the aggregate. Surprisingly, the girls-boys balance in the UG programs at MES College which was 64:36 in 2020-21 has been reversed to 47:53 in 2021-22. The number of girl students in BSc fallen steeply from 704 in 2020-21 to 311 in 2021-22. In B. Com, the number of girl students have come down from 704 to 601 in the same period. Details are in Table 1.3

As seen from data for the last two years, gender-wise enrolments during 2021-22 reveals no significant variation in Schools. Among PU Colleges, in BRSPU College, the intake of girl students has increased from 39% in 2020-21 to 47% in 2021-22, with an overall increase in enrolments from 370 to 431, whereas, it has remained at the same level in the other three PU colleges. The increase in girl students at BRSPU college could be due to parents wanting to send their children to a nearby college following the pandemic and also due to the initiatives undertaken for the safety of girl students.

In MESACS and MESIOM the number of girls admitted is showing a sharp decline in 2021-22. As regards MES College of ACS, for B.Com course, there is an 8% decrease in the enrolment of girl students and corresponding increase in the enrolment of boy students. Similarly, for PG Mathematics enrolment of girl students has increased by 36% with a corresponding decrease in boys' Intake. In MES IOM enrolment of girl students under B.Com has decreased by 10% with a corresponding increase in the enrolment of boys. So also, under BBA enrolment of girl students has decreased by 8% with a corresponding increase in the enrolment of boys. In MESACS, except for the B. Com aided sections, no strict allocation is made for equal number of seats to boys and girls. Same is the case in MES IOM.

Two possible reasons for decline in the number of girl students are:

1. Low fee structure (compared to boys) and other benefits extended to girl students in the government colleges, in our vicinity.
2. Several 'All Girls' colleges in the vicinity of both MESACS and MESIOM, where the fee structure for the same courses is comparatively less.



Chapter - 2

Academic performance during 2021-22

An analysis of the data on the academic performance of students of the two schools in the last two years reveals that the average pass percentage is 99.59%. If we discount the pandemic year 2020-21 where all students were promoted, the average pass percentage still comes to 99.19%. The percentage of distinctions and I classes including the pandemic year 2020-21 is 66.12% and 29.18% respectively and it is 68.69% and 27.04% respectively exclusive of pandemic year data. Also, the pass, distinction and I class percentages during 2021-22, when we were emerging from pandemic, is 99.19%, 69.26% and 27.04% respectively. It is heartening to note that there was no significant adverse impact in overall academic performance, due to pandemic.

However, when we compare the data of pandemic year 2020-21 and non-pandemic year 2021-22, there is an increase in the distinction category and a decrease in the I and II class categories in 2021-22. This means that while pandemic and its disruptions has not really affected the high performers, it seems to have affected the average students to some extent.

As regard PU colleges, the average pass percentage of the last two years is 90.53 and that of 2021-22 is 81.07%. A comparison of the data of 2020-21 and 2021-22 shows a significant decline in 2021-22 across all categories of passed students. This suggests that pandemic has impacted the performance of PU colleges.

Similarly, in the case of the Degree colleges, the average pass percentage of the last two years i.e., 2020-21 is 88.80% and that of 2021-22 is 86.50%. There is not much difference in the pass percentage between the two years. This implies that the pandemic has no adverse impact on the pass percentage of students in Degree Colleges.

However, an average of 13.65% failure over a two-year period, is a cause for concern. A point to be noted though is that, when we analyze the BA, B.Sc., and B.Com data separately for MESACS, as explained in table 2.4, B.Sc. has the highest failure rate.

The abstract of comparative academic performance of students in the two Schools, four PU Colleges and two Degree Colleges in the last two years is presented in Table 2.1 and the category wise performance of Schools are presented in Tables 2.2 & 2.3, PU Colleges in Tables 2.4 to 2.7 and Degree Colleges in Tables 2.8 & 2.9.

Academic Performance in Schools

Kishora Kendra High School (KKHS) and Kishore Kendra Public School (KKPS) have achieved 98.77% and 100% results respectively in 2021-22, as compared to 100% in both the institutions in 2020-21. The institution wise and category wise analysis are presented in Tables 2.2 and 2.3.

In KK High School, out of the 162 students appeared in 2021-22, 160 students have passed of which 97 are boys and 63 are girls. Out of these 160 students 97 (7-SC & Nil-ST) passed in distinction, 55 (3-SC & 1-ST) in I Class and 8 (Nil -SC & Nil-ST) in II Class. It is heartening that KK High School bagged nineteen ranks in the State Level Board Examinations of 2021-22. Also, 103 students scored centum in various subjects.

In KK Public School, 100% results were achieved in 2021-22 with all the 84 students who appeared for the examination having passed. Out of this, 39 are boys and 45 are girls. Out of these 84 students, 72 (4-SC & 2-ST) passed in distinction, 11 (1-SC & Nil-ST) in I class and 1 (Nil -SC & Nil-ST) in II Class. A proud achievement is that the school has bagged first rank for the State and second at the National level in the ICSE Board examinations of 2021-22. Also, 25 students have scored centum in various subjects.

Category-wise Academic Performance in PU Colleges

The Institution-wise, category-wise academic performance of students during the last two years in the four PU Colleges is presented in Tables 2.4 to 2.7. All the four PU Colleges had 100% results in the year 2020-21.

In ACS PU College, out of 802 students who appeared for the examination in 2021-22, 650 (SC-69 & ST-11) passed, of which 298 are boys and 352 girls. Of these 650 students, 265 (SC-39 & ST-5) passed in distinction; 360 (SC-18 & ST-4) in I class; 16 (SC-4 & ST-1) in II class; and 9 (SC-8 & ST-1) in III Class. All students who secured III class are from SC/ST category. The college secured **four ranks, two ninth rank each** in Science & Arts streams.

In KK PU College, out of the 455 students who appeared for the examination in 2021-22, 404 (SC-34 & ST-7) passed, of which 192 are boys and 212 girls. Of these 404 students, 143 (SC-5 & ST-4) passed in distinction; 241 (SC-26 & ST-1) in I class; 19 (SC-3 & ST-2) in II class; and one in III Class (SC-Nil & ST-Nil).

In MPLPU College, out of the 168 students who appeared for the examination in 2021-22, 105 (SC-4 & ST-4) passed, of which 49 are boys and 56 girls. Of these 105 students, 28 (SC-Nil & ST-2) passed in distinction; 59 (SC-2 & ST-1) in I class; 13 (SC-1 & ST-1) in II class; and five (SC-1 & ST-Nil) in III class. The college secured 10th rank in the Science stream.

In BRSPU College, out of the 170 students who appeared for the examination in 2021-22, 134 (SC-12 & ST-4) passed, of which 74 are boys and 60 girls. Of these 134 students, 32 (SC-1 & ST-1) passed in distinction; 78 (SC-5 & ST-1) in I class; 13 (SC-4 & ST-1) in II class; and 03 (SC-2 & ST-1) in III class. All students who secured III class are from SC/ST category

An overall analysis of performance in the MES Degree college shows, that out of 820 students who appeared for the BA/B.Sc./B.Com examinations in 2021-22, 708 passed (including SC-67 & ST-15), of which 299 are boys and 409 girls. Of these 708 students, 637 (SC-61 & ST-12) passed in distinction, 49 (SC-4 & ST-1) in I class and 22 (SC-2 & ST-2) students in II class.

Stream-wise analysis:

Out of 71 students who appeared for BA examination in 2021-22, 63 (SC-9 & ST-2) have passed, of which 27 are boys and 36 girls. Of these 63 students, 41 (SC-7 & ST-Nil) got distinction. No student has passed with I class.

Out of 397 students who appeared for B.Sc., examination in 2021-22, 303 have passed, of which 115 are boys and 188 girls. Of these 303 students, 288 (SC-22 & ST-7) got distinction and 15 (SC-1 & ST-Nil) got I Class.

B.Com: Out of 352 students who appeared for B.Com examination in 2021-22, 342 (SC-35 & ST-6) have passed of which 157 are boys and 185 girls. Of these 342 students, 308 (SC-32 & ST-5) got distinction and 34 (SC-3, ST-1) got I class.

An overall analysis of the performance in IOM shows that out of 424 students who appeared for the B.Com & BBA examinations of 2021-22, 362 (SC-38 & ST-5) have passed of which 180 are boys and 182 girls. Of these 362 students, 238 (SC-23 & ST-5) got distinctions and 103 (SC-14 & ST-NIL) got I Class.

Stream-wise analysis:

Out of 317 students who appeared for B.Com examination in 2021-22, 274 (SC-29 & ST-3) have passed of which 126 are boys and 148 girls. Of these 274 who passed, 171 (SC-11 & ST-NIL) got distinction and 58 (SC-11, ST-NIL) got I class.

Out of 107 students who appeared for BBA examination in 2021-22, 88 (SC-9 & ST-23) have passed of which 54 are boys and 34 girls. Of these 88 who passed, 67 (SC-5 & ST-2) got distinction and 15 (SC-3, ST-NIL) got I class.

Chapter 3

Co-Curricular and Extra-Curricular Activities

Co-curricular activities are those that are outside of but usually complement the regular curriculum. Extra-curricular activities are institution-based activities that are not tied to the curriculum. Co-curricular activities enhance social and intellectual skills, moral values, personality development and character appeal in students. They include cultural events, library and lab activities, creative arts, meditation, yoga and the like. Extra-curricular activities improve the learning experiences of students, help them identify and develop their inner talents like sports, creative and public-speaking skills, leadership qualities, etc. Both co- as well as extra-curricular activities go a long way in the holistic development of the personality of the students.

Some of the co- and extra-curricular activities taken up by the MES institutions during the year 2021-22 are given below:

3.1 Schools

MES Kishora Kendra English Medium Primary & High School: Students participated in several inter-school competitions and in-house activities like Yoga, Bharatanatyam, Smart Talk, Shloka recitation, Bhagavad-Gita chanting, Singing, Keyboard playing, Debate, Drawing, online Folk Dance, Painting, Speech competition, greeting card making etc., organised by various organisations/schools. Two students Lucky Kumar D and Rishi Kiran got the Inspire cash awards from Indian Institute of Science for their science projects. Many students took part in sports like Karate, Swimming, Skating, Cricket, Volleyball, Throwball and Badminton.

Students also participated in Olympiad exams conducted by Science Olympiad Foundation (SOF) in Science, Maths and General Knowledge. Jhenkar Gowda of IV Std. in Karate and Likhith S Reddy of IX Std. in Science and English Olympiad exams bagged Gold Medals. Likhith S Reddy of IX Std. and Tanishq J K of VIII Std. bagged Silver Medals in General Knowledge and Abacus competition respectively.

MES Kishore Kendra Public School: Students of KKPS participated in various competitions like State level Scrabble, Painting, Bhagavad-Gita recitation, Taekwondo and Olympiad exams conducted by SOF. Soumya Manjunath of VII Std. and Dhatri of I Std. bagged Gold Medals in Taekwondo in the State level competitions. Anika Upadhya of LKG in modelling and Vibhav of I Std. in Speed Kicking and Taekwondo bagged Gold medals in International level competition conducted by YS International Fashions and Dhatri of I Std. bagged Silver Medal in Speed Kicking and Taekwondo in the National Level Taekwondo competition.

Small kids are never behind. The school encouraged a nursery student, Chiranth to achieve a name in the wall of fame of Indian Book of Records for the theme "Jigsaw puzzles" (159 puzzles in 30 minutes). Another student, Anika Upadhya got the Little Princess Indian Top Model 2021 and Little Princess International 2021.

3.2 PU Colleges

ACS PU College: Celebrated Samskrutotsava on 27.08.2021 and organised a special lecture on Samskritam for youth by Dr. Chinmayananda A, Assistant Professor at IIT, Dharwad. Geetha Jayanthi was celebrated on 14.01.2022 and many students took part in online Bhagavad-Gita recitation and speech competition. Hindi Divas was celebrated on 15.11.2021. Several students participated and secured medals in Netball, Taekwondo, Football at Cluster/District/State/National level. The Kargil Vijay Divas, International Yoga Day, Sadbhavana Divas, Swachtha Divas and festivals of National importance - Republic Day, Gandhi Jayanthi, Independence Day were celebrated.

KK PU College: Several students participated in volley ball, Taekwondo, Athletics, Basket Ball, Swimming, Net ball, Boxing. Girijasiri Balambika S of I PU bagged Gold medal in State level Athletic championship, Hemanth of II PU bagged Bronze Medal in Boxing National campaign and Dhriti K R of I PU bagged Bronze Medal in State level swimming competitions.

Prof. MPL Sastry PU College: Students participated and won prizes in cultural competitions like, Music, rendering *Bhavageethe*, Film songs, *Janapada* songs, folk songs etc

Prof. BR Subba Rao PU College: A number of students representing the college participated in the District level Taekwondo, Tennis, Volley Ball and Tennikoit tournaments.

3.3 Degree Colleges

ACS Degree College: Following activities were undertaken during the year 2021-22.

1. Entrepreneurship Development Workshop was organized on 9th November 2021 which was attended by 50 students with the ambition of becoming entrepreneurs.
2. National Constitution Day was observed on 26th November 2021 to create awareness amongst the younger generation about the objectives enshrined in our constitutions and the ideas of Sovereignty, Socialism, Secularism, Democracy.
3. "Parivarthan" an intra-collegiate commerce fest was organized by the Department of Commerce on 2nd - 3rd December 2021 wherein 650 students participated. The theme was MESFLIX which depicted the various shows and web series telecasted on OTT platforms. The themes for the 9 events this year were linked to 9 web series telecast on NETFLIX. The idea being that the central concept of the web series was to be used for the particular event. Some of the events and the web series linked are i) Marketing – Mad Men, ii) Human Resources – Suits, iii) Finance – Wall Street, iv) Treasure Hunt – Indiana Jones, v) Entrepreneurship – Shark Tank, etc.
4. The newly formed Astronomy Club of the College organized a visit to Jawaharlal Nehru Planetarium for the students on 15th December 2021 and also a sky watching event from the terrace of the College.
5. Elocution, debate and essay writing competition was organised by the Electoral Literacy Cell on 25th and 27th December 2021 for the students of all streams to create awareness among the youth about electoral process, the rights and political environment to become a responsible citizen

6. Six vaccination drives for Covid protection/prevention were organised for students, staff and residents of Malleswaram from June to December 2021. 470 residents were benefited from the programme,

Placement Cell Initiatives

1. As many as 8 companies like Wipro, ANZ, Deloitte, Infosys and Northern Trust organized placement drive in which 38 students (B.Sc-7 and B.Com-31) were offered appointment/position of employment. This number is very low compared to the no. of students placed in 2019-20 which was 142 (B.Com-132 & B.Sc.-10), but slightly more encouraging compared to 2020-21 when only 21 students (B.Sc.-3 & B.Com-18) were placed.
2. A workshop on “Avenues for a Career in Public Service” was organized by the Placement Cell on 9th December 2021. The speakers were Mr. Shrimanth Chincholi, Assistant Commissioner, Mr. Poovendhan Anbarasu and Mr. Gowtham, Faculty & Mentors. In the same platform, Mrs. Deepali H Hebbali, Superintendent of Police, addressed the students on civil service examinations as well as empowerment of women. 105 students participated in the workshop.
3. A demo session on Add-on course “Tally Advance Prime” was held on 2nd November 2021 following which 95 students enrolled for the course.

Institute of Management: Orientation programme on NEP-2020 and lecture on career prospects was organized for the students. The college conducted activities related to Kannada Rajyotsava, Vak Surabhi, Indian Constitution Day, Vivekananda Saptaha, awareness on Save Soil Movement and the like.

NSS wing organized a one-day trek to Madhugiri Hills, annual NCC camp at Chikkanahalli, students offered "Shramadan" at the camp.

Placement Cell initiatives: Six companies viz., HDFC Bank, Northern Trust, HDB Financial Services, MG, Rinex and Infosys organized placement drive in which 47 students (BBA-16 and B.Com-31) were offered appointment/position of employment by these companies. Placements for the year 2021-22 showed a slight dip, compared to that of 2020-21, when 54 students (B.Com-41 and BBA-13) had got placement offers.

Teachers College: International Yoga Day was observed on 21.06.2021 through an online program and a Community Living Camp was organised for the students at Doddaballapur from 13.09.2021 to 15.09.2021.

Chapter - 4 Promotional Institutions

Rangashale: No new admissions were done during 2021-22. 16 students of 2020-21 batch who could not complete their studies due to Covid-19 continued their studies in the year 2021-22. Their exams were conducted in January 2022. Out of 16 students, 14 students took the exams and 12 students cleared the exams with I Class.

Rangashale organized guest lectures on “emotional feelings” by Sri Shashidhar Bharigat and “Kannada Literature & Drama” by Kum. Mamatha. Also, a street play “Viduraswatha Duranta (ವಿದುರಾಶ್ವಥ ದುರಂತ)” was staged at Kishora Kendra, Vidyaranyapura and Rajajinagar campuses. World Theatre Day was celebrated by organising “Sankranti”, a play by Sri P. Lankesh on 29.03.2022 at the Ravindra Kalakshetra.

Samskrutha Vidya Mandira: Prathama and Kavya examinations were conducted in Sanskrit by the Karnataka Sanskrit University in March 2022. Due to dislocations caused by the pandemic and other delays, not all the registered students could appear for the examinations. 131 and 81 students took the Prathama and Kavya examinations, out of whom 126 and 57 respectively passed. The examinations for 2020-21 were conducted online.

Kalavedi: No events were organised during the year 2021-22 due to restrictions imposed by the government in view of the pandemic situation.

Indological Library & Research Centre: No programmes were organised during the year 2021-22 due to the pandemic situation. Digitisation of the books and palm leaf manuscripts has been taken up and is in progress. About 80% of the books and 70% of the manuscripts have been digitized already.

Chapter 5 Management Initiatives

5.1 Distribution of cash awards to the toppers at the State/Board/University level examinations.

Since 2018-19, cash awards are being distributed to the toppers at the various State/Board-level examinations. In 2021-22, 36 students across MES were given cash awards amounting to Rs. 2.40 lakhs. The award winners were from the KK High School (19), KK Public School (1), four students in ACS PU College (two each in Science & Arts), one student in MPL PU College (Science), three in MES College of ACS (BA-1 & B.Sc-2), two in MES IOM (B.Com) and six in MES Teachers College (two from the 2018-20 and four from the 2019-21 batch).

5.2 Scholarships to the rank holders pursuing studies in MES institutions.

As an incentive and gesture of encouragement, all MES institutions offer academic scholarships to the top 20 students from all Streams/Boards of Study, who seek admissions in these institutions.

During 2021-22, 104 students (2 from MES KKHS and 77 from other institutions who joined MES PU Colleges and 27 students of other PU Colleges who joined Degree College) were given scholarship totalling to Rs.11.75 lakhs. Out of 104 students, 39 students joined ACS PU, 4 joined MPLPU, 7 joined BRS PU, 27 joined KKPU and 27 joined MES College of ACS.

5.3 Human Resources:

38 teachers were appointed during 2021-22. Of this, 11 (one in MES College of ACS, two in IOM, one in KKPU, six in BRSPU and one in KKPS) were full time appointees on probation on regular scale of pay. The remaining twenty-seven (all in MES College of ACS) are temporary appointments till the end of the academic year, which includes part-time and leave vacancies. A total of 478 (358 – teaching, 120 non-teaching and 32 part time & temporary teachers) staff from all the institutions are on roll during 2021-22. All the 358 full time teachers possess the required qualifications.

Remembrance

MES paid tribute to Mr. B K Subburaman, Chief Executive who passed away suddenly on 6th December 2021 and placed on record the sincere appreciation and gratitude for his lasting contributions in strengthening the Management office. MES lost two dedicated and sincere faculty Mr. Narasimha Murthy M, Associate Professor in the Department of Physics and Smt. Matheswari P, Assistant Professor Department of Computer Science at MES College of ACS due to Covid. Contributions of the two teachers are acknowledged and appreciated.

5.4 Augmentation of Learning Resources

Library resources in the form of Books, Journal's magazines and e-resources in all Institutions were increased significantly during the year. In all 15,745 books were added to the libraries of all institutions which include Text Books, Reference Books, General Books and Fiction. Also, there was an augmentation in the library subscriptions for Journals/e-resources/magazines. The cost for augmentation of library resources for 2021-22 at all Institutions is Rs. 6.42 lakhs as compared to 2,118 books at Rs. 2.52 lakhs in 2020-21.

5.5 Information & Communication Technology

ICT support was stepped up to meet the requirements of enabling smart classrooms in the PU and Degree colleges. The total investment on ICT during 2021-22 is Rs.132.30 lakhs as compared to Rs.53.44 lakhs in 2020-21. The major ICT investments were on the purchase of Interactive Projectors, Sliding Frames, White Boards, Webcams, Desktops and CCTV servicing.

The preliminary meeting as part of Continuous Professional Development (CPD) initiative from MES was held with Educafe team to equip all Teaching staff in each Institution with blended learning skills.

5.6 Governance

5.6.1 Meetings held during 2021-22

One Annual General Meeting, Two Managing Committee Meetings and seven meetings with the HOIs on admissions, organising CPD and SAMVAD programs were held during the year 2021-22.

5.6.2 Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP)

Due to lack of support from the ERP vendor M/s Aparimitha Technologies, not much progress could be made during the year in new modules like Library, Alumni connect, Asset Management etc. Hence, alternate vendors like Edchemy, MCB etc., have been identified and are being assessed.

5.6.3 MES Website

Websites of all Institutions are updated with the latest information. Annual Report of 2020-21 has been uploaded on the website. Documents related to NAAC were uploaded in MES ACS and MES IOM websites for submission of Self Study Report (SSR) and relevant pages of the website were redesigned as per the requirements of NAAC.

5.7 Student Welfare

5.7.1 Group Personal Accident Insurance

MES subscribes to a Group Insurance Policy with SBI General Insurance to provide various benefits under personal accident scheme. This covers all the students and one earning parent/guardian of the student. It also includes all the regular teaching and non-teaching staff of the schools and colleges. An amount Rs. 3.07 lakh was paid as premium during 2021-22. Covering 8791 students and one earning parent of each student, 342 eligible teaching staff, 137 non-teaching staff and 9 MC members during the year 2021-22. There were no claims during the year.

5.7.2 Student Welfare Fund

The scheme which is in operation since 2002 provides for financial aid, mid-day meals and note books to students. Mid-day meals were not provided during the year due lack of canteen facilities. 80 students from two schools, 177 from four PU Colleges and 97 from two Degree Colleges were given financial aid amounting to Rs. 20.09 lakhs ranging from Rs.5000/- to Rs.7000/- per student from the interest earned on the Fixed Deposits maintained in the SWF. 112 students of MES PU and MES College of ACS were distributed Note Books worth Rs.22,400/- through the MES Cooperative Society.

5.8 Staff Welfare

MES has always been an enlightened and conscientious employer. During the pandemic, it was ensured that salaries of the teachers and staff were paid on time. In 2021-22, Interim Relief of 20% of the Basic Pay was granted to the employees, together with annual increments for the two pandemic years and other benefits such as senior scale and selection grade as per the Cadre & Recruitment Rules, 2017. The total outgo on this account was Rs. 6.16 crores. This has been appreciated by all the employees.

5.8.1 Contribution towards Provident Fund and Employees State Insurance

Provident Fund is a post-retirement benefit as mandated under the Employees Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952. A total contribution of Rs. 1.69 crore was made during the year 2021-22 in respect of 452 employees including six employees retired during the year. 27 temporary employees are not covered under the scheme. The PF claims/settlement will be done by the employee himself/herself online. Employees whose wages are less than Rs.21,000/- are covered by the ESI scheme where the employer and the employee contribute to the scheme. Rs.4.62 lakhs were paid as employers' contribution during the year. This enabled 56 non-teaching employees to avail the benefits for ailments, maternity and injury while on duty.

5.8.2 Staff Group Gratuity Policy

MES has also subscribed to a Group Gratuity Policy with LIC covering 446 regular employees appointed by the Management. Six employees (retired-3, resigned-2, expired-1) received gratuity settlement totaling to Rs.19.04 lakhs. Besides a premium of Rs. 4.11 lakhs, a one-time contribution of Rs.521.96 lakhs was also made to the LIC Group Gratuity Trust Fund during the year 2021-22. This will go towards reducing the future liabilities of MES calculated on an actuarial basis.

5.8.3 Ex-Gratia payment to staff: Aided and unaided staff retired on superannuation.

The Management has been paying an ex-gratia amount of Rs.20,000/- to the aided teaching and non-teaching staff on their retirement. Similarly, employees appointed by the Management are paid Rs.40,000/- as ex-gratia at the time of their retirement. Under this scheme, four teaching and one non-teaching staff appointed by the Management who retired on superannuation have been paid Rs. 40,000/- each and. three aided teaching and one non-teaching staff have been paid Rs. 20,000/- each during 2021-22. The total amount paid is Rs. 2.80 lakhs.

5.8.4 Fee Concession to the children of staff at MES Institutions

Since 2002, the Management has been extending fee concession to one child of permanent employees appointed by the Management in the form of exemption from payment of Tuition Fee and Special Development Fee. This was revised in 2021 by limiting the concession amount to a lumpsum amount of Rs.20,000/-. 96 staff members availed fee concessions amounting to Rs. 19.20 lakhs during 2021-22. Of these 65 are from the two Schools, 19 from three PU Colleges and 12 are from the two Colleges.

5.9 Infrastructure Augmentation and Maintenance

1. To address the issue of space constraint, the Management had taken up construction above the stage at MESKK, Malleswaram. The following facilities have been created at the cost of Rs. 2.50 crores.

- ❖ Five class rooms in the 2nd, 3rd & 4th floor for High School & PU.
- ❖ Yoga Room in 2nd floor.
- ❖ One large sports room in 5th floor.

With the above facilities, a total floor area of 7500 sft has been created. This is an increase of 9.43% over the existing space of 79,487 sft

2. In anticipation of the NAAC peer team visit, the following repair and maintenance works are taken up and completed.

MES IOM, Rajajinagar:

- ❖ Revamping of existing rain water harvesting at a cost of Rs. 4.61 lakhs.
- ❖ Refurbishing of existing canteen at a cost of Rs. 6.43 lakhs
- ❖ Renovation of Gents toilet in 3rd floor at a cost of Rs. 4.60 lakhs.

MES ACS College, Malleswaram.

- ❖ Complete painting & distempering works at a cost of Rs. 29.80 lakhs
- ❖ Revamping of existing rain water harvesting at a cost of Rs. 4.68 lakhs
- ❖ Establishment of commerce lab at a cost of Rs. 4.33 lakhs

3. The Management had purchased properties bearing nos. 52, 54 and 55, adjacent to the MES Degree College measuring in all 4128 sft. Demolition works in these properties has already been taken up. Discussions are going on with the neighbor regarding safety measures. In addition to the above properties the Management is negotiating with owners of the adjacent properties bearing nos. 53 and 56.

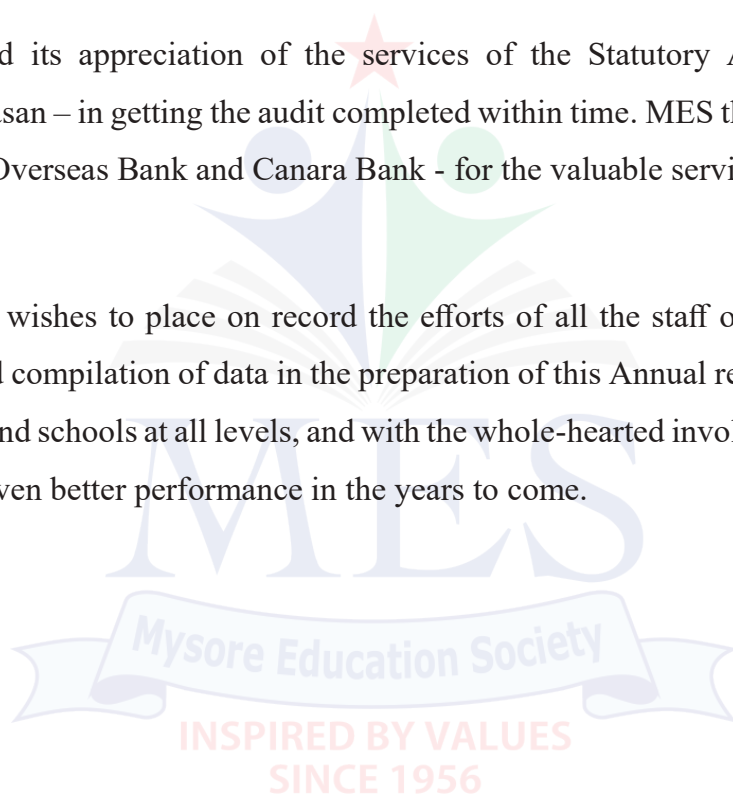
Besides the above a sum of Rs. 1.95 crores was spent on repairs and maintenance across all the institutions during 2021-22.
