

Chapter 1 Enrolment

1.1 Analysis of Admissions

The data for the years 2024-25 and 2023-24 is shown in Table 1.1. The year 2024-25 saw an increase of **3.55%** in capacity utilization. However, there is a decrease of **6.8%** in sanctioned strength mainly due to the net decrease **930** seats, in the degree colleges.

Schools:

- ➤ MES KK Public School consistently enrolled above its sanctioned intake in both years, achieving 100% capacity utilization. This is a clear indication of the demand the school has.
- ➤ In comparison MES KK Malleswaram though having a high percentage of capacity utilization does not touch 100% in both years. There is a significant drop of 2.39% in capacity utilization. This is primarily due to the drop in demand in Nursery seats as the analysis of class wise enrolment has revealed.

PU Colleges:

- ➤ In 2024-25, KK PU College, Malleswaram, and BRS PU College, Vidyaranyapura, had the highest capacity utilization, both exceeding 92%, both showing an increase in capacity utilization compared to 2023-24.
- ➤ Conversely, ACS PU College and MPL PU College experienced a slight decrease in their capacity utilization over the same period. MPL PU College, Rajajinagar continues to have the lowest capacity utilization, staying below 61% in both years.
- These PU colleges have different challenges in terms of, the different localities they are in, major competitor colleges around them, including Government colleges and the economic status of the students that seek admission to them. In spite of this, barring MPL PU college the others have a high percentage of utilization. MES ACS and MES KK are located adjacent to each other and further MES ACS being a GIA institution has a significantly lower fee structure compared to KK and also a larger sanctioned strength, yet KK has a better utilization. This could be an indicator of the overall quality of Institution. The major cause for concern remains MES MPL PU college. It may be necessary to introduce in-demand combinations and drop conventional combinations that have less demand as a strategy, particularly at MES MPL PU college.

Degree Colleges

- ➤ Varying Trends: The two-degree colleges show contrasting trends in capacity utilization between 2023-24 and 2024-25. MES College of ACS, Malleswaram, experienced an increase in its utilization rate, while the Institute of Management, Rajajinagar, saw a decrease. However, the below 40% capacity utilization in MESACS in both the years and a decline to 68.8% from 80.38% for MESIOM in 2024-25 are serious cause for concern.
- Factors Influencing Utilization: Changes in capacity utilization are influenced by both adjustments in sanctioned intake and fluctuations in actual enrolment. For MES College of ACS, the strategic reduction in sanctioned intake played a key role in its increased utilization, while for the Institute of Management, a decline in actual enrolment despite increased intake led to lower utilization. While MES ACS is a multidisciplinary college MESIOM has only Commerce. A deeper analysis of Discipline wise enrolment reveals that the decline in MES ACS is primarily due to decrease in demand for Arts and Science programs

PG Mathematics and PG Kannada

- ➤ The sanctioned strength for PG Maths has been reduced to 60 in 2024-25 as against 70 in 2023-24 The capacity utilisation shows an decrease of 3%. The capacity utilization is ≤50% in both the years. This indicates the low demand for the program.
- ➤ The extremely low-capacity utilization in PG Kannada is a major cause for concern and needs to be seriously examined.

1.2 Category wise Admission Analysis

The MES educational institutions shows a complex picture of growth, decline, and transformation. While overall enrollment declined slightly, significant demographic shifts are occurring with OBC students gaining increased access and GM students showing declining participation. The most critical concern is the ST student's access crisis, which may require immediate intervention. Institutions show widely varying intake, from stable growth to concerning transformations, suggesting the need for differentiated strategies and support systems.

Kishore Kendra Public School Vidyaranyapura

Kendra Public School Vidyaranyapura shows stable overall enrollment with a significant demographic shift toward increased OBC representation and decreased GM enrollment in 2024-25 compared to 2023-24. This change represents a more balanced representation across categories while maintaining the school's total capacity.

- ➤ The most notable trend is the substantial increase in OBC category students, which has increased by 9% from the previous year.
- > There was a corresponding decrease in GM category students by 8.72% suggesting a shift in the demographic composition rather than overall growth.
- > GM students, however, continue to be the largest faction
- > SC numbers remained constant while ST showed a minor decrease.

The school maintains consistent total enrolment of 100%. The changes appear to reflect shifting demographics in admissions

Kishora Kendra Malleswaram

The data for MES KK Malleswaram in table 1.1 on page 3 reveals a decrease 2.4% in enrollment in 2024-25 compared to 2023-34. Category wise the decreases is maximum about 2.46 % in GM , marginal 0.5% in SC and \sim 0.4% in ST and an increase of 3.33 % in OBC . The data suggests that while Kishore Kendra Malleswaram maintains strong enrollment with good representation of backward classes, attention should be given to improving ST enrollment and understanding the factors behind the recent decline in total enrollment and in the GM category

Strengths:

- Despite a slight decrease, enrollment remains robust above 1,400 students
- ➤ OBC students constitute the majority (66.26% in 2024-25), indicating good accessibility for backward classes

Representation across all social categories indicates an inclusive education policy in place

Areas of Concern:

- > 2.4% decrease in total enrollment year-over-year
- > ST representation is very low (1.02%) in 2024 has been declining.
- > Significant decrease in General Merit category enrollment.

ACS PU College

MES ACS PU College shows good representation across all categories with no single category being underrepresented Further there is a healthy enrollment growth with a notable shift toward increased General Merit students while maintaining its character as an institution with a strong commitment to social inclusion with nearly 80% enrollment from reserved categories (SC+ST+OBC)

- ➤ OBC category remains the largest group, comprising nearly two-thirds of total enrollment (62.91% in 2024-25)
- ➤ The most notable trend is the substantial increase in G:eneral Merit students, growing by over one-third from the previous year.
- ➤ Despite a decrease in absolute numbers, SC students still maintain significant representation (14.03%)
- > ST representation remained relatively stable with minor growth.

KK PU College

There is a moderate increase in overall enrollment. OBC and GM are the dominant categories of students enrolled accounting for about 87% of the enrolled strength, the major contribution coming from OBC students

> The college shows a steady enrollment increase without dramatic shifts, Category-wise percentages remained relatively stable.

- The College shows a more balanced distribution between OBC and GM categories averaging 47.93% and 38.9% respectively across two years.
- > SC students comprise about 11-12% of enrollment, which is reasonable representation
- > ST representation remains minimal but showed growth in 2024-25.
- ➤ The college attracts students from diverse backgrounds fairly equally and shows the most balanced representation between reserved and general categories.

MPL PU College

MPL PU College, Rajajinagar experienced the most dramatic demographic transformation shifting from a balanced OBC-GM institution to an OBC-dominant college. While this represents improved access for reserved categories (particularly OBC and SC students), the significant decline in GM enrolment and overall student numbers raises concerns about institutional sustainability and market position. The college needs strategic intervention to maintain its inclusive character while addressing factors that may be deterring GM students.

Category-wise Changes

- ✓ Scheduled Caste (SC) Percentage increased significantly: 10.39% to 12.87%
- ✓ Scheduled Tribe (ST) Marginal decrease by 0.46%
- ✓ Other Backward Class (**OBC**) Percentage increased substantially: 45.19% to 60.05%
- ✓ General Merit (**GM**) Percentage decreased dramatically: 42.08% to 25.20%
- ✓ Despite overall enrollment decline, OBC and SC students increased both in numbers and percentage, while GM and ST decreased. This clearly indicates the demographic shift.

BRS PU College

BRS PU College demonstrates modest but positive growth trajectory (3.15% increase) and overall growth potential with strong OBC community engagement but faces a very low ST access and GM retention challenges. The institution may need intervention for ST student access while developing long-term strategies to maintain balanced, sustainable growth across all categories.

Category-wise Analysis

- > SC representation remains robust around 11-12%, showing institutional commitment to SC community access with virtually no change in enrolment.
- ➤ ST Critical decline An area of concern. This represents the most severe decline among all categories and institutions. ST enrolment dropped by nearly half, indicating very low representation of ST community.
- ➤ Other Backward Class (**OBC**) It remains the primary driver of enrolment and showed robust growth, becoming the dominant category and crossing the 49% threshold. This indicates that the OBC community has improved accessibility.
- ➤ General Merit (GM): GM category shows a moderate decline, dropping from being nearly equal to OBC students to becoming the second-largest group. This suggests competitive pressure or institutional positioning challenges.

MES ACS Degree College

There is an overall decline of 9.70% in enrolment across all categories. This could be primarily due to the strategic reduction of sanctioned intake from 5100 to 4110 and the continued fall in demand for science and arts programs

Category-wise Analysis

- > Scheduled Caste (SC): The enrolment showed only one student less while improving their percentage representation due to overall enrolment decline. This indicates strong access and community loyalty to the institution.
- > Scheduled Tribe (ST) Shows a positive growth. ACS degree college is one of the institutions in MES showing ST growth. While numbers remain small, but stable, it is indicative of effective ST access & inclusion.
- ➤ Other Backward Class **(OBC)** There is a decline in this category. It experienced the largest absolute decline, however they remain the dominant group at over 60%, indicating continued strong institutional appeal despite competitive pressures.
- ➤ General Merit (GM) This category shows a marginal decline consistent with institutional trend. GM students declined at a rate similar to OBC students indicating system-wide competitive challenges rather than category-specific deterrents. The category has a maintained stable representation around 22-23% while the roaster mandates 50%.

The college maintained equitable treatment across categories, with major groups (OBC, GM) declining proportionally while protecting vulnerable categories (SC, ST). Despite losing 118 reserved category

students, the college actually increased their percentage representation, demonstrating protective policies for these communities. The college's commitment to social inclusion provides a strong foundation for recovery, but immediate strategic intervention is essential to reverse the enrolment decline and ensure long-term sustainability while preserving its mission of serving diverse communities equitably.

MES IOM Degree College

The college witnessed a moderate enrolment decline, but less severe than MES College of ACS about 7.82% decline. However, the capacity utilization (Table 1.1, Page 3) declines to 69% from 80% is a major concern. Reserved categories (OBC & ST) declined more significantly than GM categories, which is unusual compared to other institutions.

Category-wise Analysis

- Scheduled Caste (SC). A minor growth with improved representation is observed. SC students showed positive growth both in absolute numbers and percentage representation, indicating improved accessibility and institutional commitment to SC community inclusion
- Scheduled Tribe (ST) This category shows a significant decline which remains an area of concern. ST enrolment declined from 11 to 7, which is a concern. This follows the concerning ST decline pattern seen across multiple institutions in MES.
- ➤ Other Backward Class (**OBC**) students experienced the largest absolute decline but maintained their dominant position at nearly 58% of enrolment. The decline rate was proportional to overall institutional trend.
- ➤ General Merit (**GM**) This category shows a minor decrease in absolute numbers, remaining at about 29% average across 2023-24 & 2024-25.

An important observation to be reported is that in both the degree colleges. GM enrollment remains below 30%. This needs to be looked into.

Category wise Enrollment of PG Mathematics and PG Kannada

- ➤ The category-wise enrolment data reveals distinct patterns for PG Mathematics and PG Kannada at MES College of ACS, Malleswaram.
- ➤ OBC students form the overwhelming majority in both PG Mathematics and PG Kannada programmes across both academic years, generally comprising over 64% of the students
- ➤ PG Mathematics experienced a decrease in overall enrolment, while its category distribution remained largely stable, with OBC students dominating and an absence of ST students in 2024-25.
- ➤ PG Kannada witnessed a substantial increase in total enrolment and a notable diversification in its student demographics in 2024-25. While OBC students remained the largest group, their proportion decreased as the representation of SC, ST, and GM students increased.
- A point of concern is only 1 GM student has enrolled in PG Kannada in 2 years.
- ➤ In 2024-25, PG Kannada shows a higher proportional representation of SC and ST students compared to PG Mathematics.
- ➤ The major cause for concern is ofcourse the very low capacity utilization shows in Table 1.1, Page 3.

1.3 Analysis of Gender wise admission

Kishora Kendra Public school

Kishore Kendra Public School stands out as an exemplary model of gender equity in education, achieving near-perfect gender balance across both academic years. While facing a modest overall enrolment increase the school has successfully maintained an inclusive environment where girls comprise nearly 50% of the students. The school's achievement in gender parity, particularly with female majorities in Primary and High School sections, demonstrates that equitable education is achievable.

Kishore Kendra School Malleswaram

While Kishore Kendra School shows overall growth in enrollment, the persistent gender imbalance remains a key challenge. The school serves approximately 60% boys and 40% girls consistently across both years. The slight improvement in girls' growth rate is encouraging, but targeted interventions are needed to achieve better gender parity, particularly at the Pre-Primary level where the gap is most pronounced.

Pre University Colleges

The Pre-University Colleges demonstrate a positive model of gender equity in higher secondary education, with an overall enrolment of 50.5%., suggesting greater access to girls students' progress to pre-university education.

The success of ACS PU College in maintaining 54.3% female enrolment provides a model for other PU institutions to follow.

The college's success in attracting women to science education (67.6% in B.Sc.) is particularly commendable and positions it as a leader in promoting gender equity in STEM fields.

The institution serves as a positive example of how higher education can successfully engage female students, particularly in traditionally male-dominated fields like science, while maintaining overall growth and institutional sustainability.

The significant gender shift toward females in B.Com. (from 45.1% to 51.6% female) is to be noted. The college's ability to maintain overall gender balance is noteworthy but targeted interventions are needed to address greater enrolment and capacity utilization.

PG Mathematics

The PG Mathematics program represents a success story in gender equity and STEM education, with an extraordinary 87% female enrolment across 2 years. This program completely reverses traditional gender stereotypes in mathematics, demonstrating that when barriers are removed and environments are supportive, women excel in advanced mathematical studies. It positions the institution as a leader in gender-inclusive STEM education. However, the extreme gender imbalance (average of 18.5%)

males) suggests the need for balanced strategies to attract more male students. The low capacity utilization below 50% remains a major cause for concern.

PG Kannada

The strength of PG Kannada increased from 8 to 14 out of a sanctioned intake of 40. Among the students who have joined girls out number boys. As already mentioned, the extremely low demand for this program needs to be studied and addressed.

Solution Chapter 2 **Academic performance during 2024 – 25**

2.1 Overall Analysis of Academic Performance

Schools:

- There is a strong academic environment in both KK SCHOOL and KK PUBLIC SCHOOL, with consistently high pass rates. KK PUBLIC SCHOOL demonstrates exceptional academic performance by achieving a perfect 100% pass rate with zero failures in both 2023-24 and 2024-25, despite a decrease in its students taking the X Grade exam. Its division distribution suggests a high quality of passes, with a significant proportion of students achieving Distinction and I class and no Third Divisions in 2024-25.
- ➤ KK SCHOOL, while not achieving a 100% pass rate, showed an increase in student enrolment for SSLC and a slight improvement in its pass percentage from 97.1% to 97.5% between the two years. It also saw a positive shift in the distribution of passes, with a greater number of students achieving Distinction in 2024-25 compared to in the previous year. However, it consistently recorded 4 failures each year and had an increase in Third Division passes in 2024-25.

In essence, KK PUBLIC SCHOOL excels in absolute and quality of academic success while KK SCHOOL shows positive trends in the quality of its passes, even with a larger number of students taking the board exam.

PU colleges

- All the PU colleges have done exceedingly well showing a high pass percentage. Among the four, while MES ACS has maintained a steady and high pass percentage MES KK PU shows an increase, BRS PU has improved considerably, while there is a decline in MPL PU college
- ACS PU College and MES KK PU College have a high proportion of distinctions and first classes which highlight the quality of their results while in comparison MES MPL and BRS PU has significantly low number of distinctions which reflects a lesser quality of result
- ➤ Though BRS PU College has shown an increase in the pass percentage the distinction rates has dropped considerably and more students have obtained I, II & III Class.

➤ MPL PU COLLEGE showed a decline in its pass rate from 94.4% to 89% and recorded the lowest pass percentage among these colleges in 2024-25. This is cause for concern as the number of students appearing for Board exam was also lower.

Degree Colleges:

- The data for the two degree colleges are for the AY 2022-23 and 2023-24 due to the calendar of events for degree colleges. Considering that MES ACS has three times the strength of MES IOM and it is multidisciplinary college while, IOM is essentially a commerce college, we note that MES ACS outperforms IOM with an average pass percentage of 92.7 % to 86.1% respectively. Further while MESACS has maintained the pass percentage IOM shows a sharp decline of almost 20% in 2023-24 which is a matter of serious concern.
- ➤ Out of the 92.7% students who passed MES ACS has 98 % of students securing Distinctions and First class in 2023-24. In terms of Distinction MES ACS shows a 7-fold increase and a corresponding decrease in I class which is a remarkable increase in quality of result.
- ➤ Of the 76.5% students who passed MES IOM has about ~91% of students securing Distinctions and First class in 2023-24 and in terms of Distinction MES IOM, there is about 30% increase in distinctions and a drop of almost 36% in I classes and a fivefold increase in failure. The percentage of students who scored distinctions & I Class in 2022-23 was 97.2%. This clearly indicates a decline in the quality of result. The overall pass percentage of the year 2023-24 for MESIOM seem to be skewed and the institution needs to figure out the cause.

2.2 MES KK Public School Vidyaranyapura

- The table provides a clear picture of the academic performance at **Kishora Kendra Public School** over two academic years, 2023-24 and 2024-25. The most prominent feature is the school's **unwavering commitment to academic success, evidenced by a 100% pass rate across all student categories in both years**, with no failures.
- ➤ While maintaining this perfect pass record, the school experienced an overall decrease in student enrolment from 89 to 77 students. This decrease was primarily fuelled by a substantial decline in students from the General Merit (GM) category.
- ➤ Concurrently, there was a shift in the academic outcomes, with an decrease in Distinction and Second Division achievements, results in 2024-25, contrasting with the previous year's distribution which had lower First Division numbers.
- ➤ There were no students belonging to ST category in 2024-25.

2.3 MES KK School Malleswaram

➤ Table 2.2 provides a comprehensive overview of Kishora Kendra School's academic performance, highlighting both consistency and evolving trends between the 2023-24 and 2024-25 academic years. While the school maintained a consistently high overall pass rate (above 97%) across both years, there was a increase in total student enrollment and a slight increase in the overall pass percentage in 2024-25.

- The data reveals a that the SC category's performance, achieving a 100% pass rate in 2023-24 has declined to 93.3% in 2024-25 due to 1 failure. The ST category has consistently maintained its perfect pass record, with the subsequent year's students achieving higher divisions.
- > OBC continues to the major category both in terms of number of students as well as in the quality of performance.
- The GM category experienced a improvement in its pass percentage and a decrease in failures. Across all categories, there was a general shift in the distribution of academic achievements; more students attained the highest Distinction, while a smaller proportion secured the First Division, and no significant change in Second and Third Divisions.
- > The data reveals that while the school largely maintains high academic standards, there are specific category-wise fluctuations in both enrollment and the quality of student achievement.

2.4 MES ACS PU College

- \triangleright ACS PU College demonstrates a consistently high overall pass percentage \sim 97% across both years, with a very low failure rate.
- A primary analytical insight is the significant re-distribution of academic achievements in 2024-25, where the number of students achieving 'Distinction' grades decreased substantially, while those achieving First Class increased proportionally. This trend is most prominent in the OBC and GM categories, which constitute the majority of the student body.
- The ST category showed excellent improvement, achieving a 100% pass rate in 2024-25.
- The GM category consistently excelled with the highest pass percentages.
- > The OBC category remained the largest and maintained a high pass rate, though it was significantly affected by the grade distribution shift.
- ➤ The SC category experienced a slight dip in pass percentage and a reduction in higher grade achievements in 2024-25.

➤ Total student enrollment and the number of failed students remained relatively stable between the two academic years.

Overall, while the college maintains strong pass rates, there is an overall decrease in the high achievers.

2.5 MES KK PU College

- The overall academic performance in KKPU College improved in 2024-25 compared to 2023-24, as evidenced by a higher total pass percentage (98.8% vs. 97.4%) and a significant reduction in the number of failing students (5 against 13). The OBC and GM categories consistently maintained exceptionally high pass percentage.
- Despite the higher overall pass rate, there was a clear decline in the number of students achieving Distinction while those achieving First Class remains relatively stable, particularly noticeable in the SC category where distinctions plummeted. This was compensated by a substantial increase in students passing with First, Second- and Third-Class. This indicates a broadening of the passing base, possibly at the expense of top-tier academic achievements.
- > The ST category experienced a notable drop in its pass percentage and saw an increase in failures in 2024-25, despite its smaller student count.
- The overall decline in distinctions across most categories despite improved pass rates also presents an interesting trend for the college to analyse and address.

2.6 MES MPL PU College

- There was a general decline in academic performance at MPL PU College from 2023-24 to 2024-25. This is evidenced by a lower overall pass percentage (from 94.4% to 89%).
- A significant reduction in Distinction and First-Class achievers, and an increase in the total number of failures, despite a smaller number of students appearing for the examination in 2024-25 is a cause for concern
- The most pronounced change is the substantial decrease in students achieving Distinction grades across all categories, particularly within the OBC and GM categories, which previously contributed the highest numbers of top performers.
- ➤ OBC & GM experienced a decline in their pass percentages and an increase in failures. The ST category is a notable exception, achieving a 100% pass rate in 2024-25, although this achievement is based on just 2 student passing.
- > The rising number of failures across multiple categories contributed to the overall drop in the college's pass rate.

2.7 MES BRS PU College

Table 2.7 provides an overview of academic performance at BRS PU College over two consecutive years, 2023-24 and 2024-25.

The most prominent observation is the overall improvement in the college's academic outcomes in 2024-25 compared to 2023-24. The total pass percentage rose from 91.4% to 97.6%, accompanied by a drastic decrease in the number of failed students from 24 to 7. This indicates a general uplift in student success rates across various categories.

- ➤ On a category-wise basis, all student categories (SC, ST, OBC, GM) demonstrated improved pass percentages in the latter year. The GM category maintained the highest pass rate, reaching 99% in 2024-25.
- ➤ While the ST category showed considerable improvement, it consistently has the lowest pass percentage compared to other categories in both academic years.
- ➤ Interestingly, despite the overall increase in pass rates and decrease in failures, there was a general decline in the number of students achieving Distinctions, particularly noticeable in the GM and SC.
- ➤ The OBC category shows a increase in all grades indicating improved performance by this cohort of students. The OBC category notably expanded in size and also significantly improved its pass percentage, reducing failures effectively.
- ➤ This suggests a broader distribution of passing performance across different grade categories, indicating that more students are passing, but not necessarily achieving the highest academic honors at the same rate as the previous year.

Chapter 3

Co-Curricular, Extra-Curricular and Extension Activities

Chapter 4

Promotional Ventures

4.1 Rangashale is a theatrical and cultural platform of MES, affiliated to Karnataka State Dr. Gangubai Hanagal Music and Performing Arts University. Rangashale offers a one year diploma program in theater arts. 19 students were admitted for this one year Diploma in Theater, in the academic year 2024-25. 17 Students appeared for I semester exam, among them 2 students have secured distinction and 15 students have secured first class.

Rangashale has reached thousands of audiences through its performances throughout Karnataka, and one of the highlight performances of 2024, is the "Machideva" played at Shiva Sanchara Rastriya Natakothsava-2024 held at Sri Shivakumara Kala Sangha ®, Sanehalli, Hosadurga Taluk, Chitradurga Dist.)

- **4.2 Samskrutha Vidya Mandira:** Students of MES KK School, Malleswaram are trained for Prathama examination in Sanskrit conducted by the Karnataka Sanskrit University in February 2025. Out of the 140 students who registered, 131 appeared for Prathama examination and 129 students cleared the examination. The examinations were conducted in an off-line mode.
- **4.3 Kalavedi:** Like in the previous years, Kalavedi has continued its tradition of organizing Music & Dance concerts in 2024-25 as well; The regular monthly concerts were held in both Malleswaram & Vidyaranyapura campuses. While Malleswaram campus hosted 12 events and Vidyaranyapura campus hosted 6 events. The Annual three days **MPL Sastry Music festival** and **Kalavedi Dance Festival** were also held. The unique feature this year was, the winner of the Dance & Music competition among students was given a platform to perform at Kalavedi's annual Dance & Music festival respectively. The annual Inter MES Institutions youth Festival "**Yuvajanothsava**" saw superb performance. Students of MES KKPS (Primary School), MES KK School (High School), MES KK PU College (PU Colleges) and MES ACS Degree College bagged the championship among our institutions. The honorarium to the artists and other activities for the year 2024-25 amounted to Rs. 11.45 lakhs.
- **4.4 Indological Library & Research Centre:** During the academic year 2024–25, the Indological Library and Research Centre undertook several key initiatives in library maintenance, infrastructure improvement, and cultural engagement. The following is a summary of the activities and events conducted during the year:

> Library Maintenance and Upkeep

- 1. In June, a thorough cleaning of all books in the library was carried out to maintain cleanliness and ensure the preservation of resources.
- 2. Initiated the digitization of rare and old books to enhance accessibility and preservation. As of now, 150 books have been scanned, and the process is ongoing.
- 3. A generous contribution of 200 books related to Indian Knowledge System from NMKRV College, Jayanagar was received & gratefully acknowledged.
- 4. Facilitated the donation of India's ancient spiritual 50 books and 25 decorative flower pots to the library by Sri Bala Chandra Rao, as well-wisher of MES, Malleshwaram, Bengaluru.

> Infrastructure Improvement

Electrical repair work, including replacement of switch-board and cable was carried out to ensure safety and uninterrupted service.

> Cultural Events

ILRC organized an inter-school competition on the occasion of the Bhagavad Gita Jayanti on December 6th 2024, which saw the participation of almost 100 students from 15 institutions. The valedictory ceremony was held on December 9th for which the chief guest was Shri Aditya H.N. Professor at Paripoorna Sanatana Ayurveda Medical College, Nelamangala, Bangalore.

- ➤ Asthavadhana is a traditional literary performance in Indian culture where a single person responds to eight different intellectual challenges at the same time. It is an exceptional talent which demonstrates memory power, multitasking ability, and poetic skill. Indological Library and Research Centre successfully coordinated the Ashtavadana cultural event on March 15th, 2025, featuring renowned scholar Shatavadhani Dr. R. Ganesh.

5.2 Continuous Professional Development (CPD)

Faculty Development Program for Science Teachers

As part of our continuing endeavor to promote professional development among teachers, a ten days training program for all the science teachers (Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics & Biology) of our PU Colleges was conducted between 29.09.2024 to 08.10.2024.

This teacher training program was organized by MES, in collaboration with the Talent Development Centre (TDS) run by Indian Institute of Science (IISc) at Challakere, Karnataka.

The TDC, for the 'first time', collaborated with a private educational organization and extended its facility of teacher training to MES on account of our fine reputation.

The total number of teacher participants who benefitted from this training is 74 and the cost incurred is Rs. 15.93 lakhs.

The ten days residential training program was received well by the teachers and the feedback, reflected the following points:

- ❖ Curriculum was well structured to convey concepts of I & II PU Syllabus, in a thorough manner, using emerging technologies in the field of education.
- ❖ Laboratory sessions were particularly valuable, offering teachers the opportunity to engage in hands-on learning.
- ❖ Assignments and tests ensured that the teachers did the necessary follow-up.
- Resource materials provided were very informative and useful, and would be of help in further learning.
- Hospitality was good.

The 'learning' received from the training program was put in practice, in small implementable steps, by majority of the teachers. This was particularly true in topics, where theory concepts were taught, using simple demonstration techniques. The program was conceived, planned and executed by Chief Executive Prof. K.M. Raghavendran & Director Academics (HE) Prof. Sheela Menon.

5.3 Certificate in Foundational Stage (covering ECCE)

Batch II / 2024

The classes for the second batch began on 3rd January 2024 commenced with an Induction program. The following are the main activities conducted for the batch. Students were taken to Vishweshwaraiah Science Museum. Guest lecture was arranged on various topics like Foundational Literacy and Numeracy, Classroom Management at preschool stage, Art and Craft in teaching preschool children. Students were taken to MES Kishora Kendra Malleswaram and MESKK Public School Vidyaranyapura to observe the classroom interactions. Students were oriented about domains of development, activities of preschool, literacy and numeracy, teaching learning materials, lesson plan writing and how to observe a class.

Internship was held in MES Kishora Kendra preschool. Students got the training under the guidance of experienced teachers. They acquired the skills of handling the children at foundational stage. A. All the students participated and presented their views on the topic. Rangoli, pick and speak, musical chair, drawing, and essay writing competitions were held for the students. Art and Craft workshop, theme based presentation and discussion on NEP and ECCE, visit to BEL Ashankura special school, Phonetics workshop were the other activities conducted for the students.

Final examination was held from 14th June to 22nd June 2024. Viva was conducted on 22nd June 2024. Valedictory and convocation was conducted on 16th July 2024.

Batch III / 2024

The classes for the third batch began on 14th June 2024 began with an Induction Program. The students and staff visited BEL Ashankura Special School and learnt the needs of the children and the way they are educated depending upon their needs. Students were taken to MES KK Public School, Vidyaranyapura allowed to observe the classroom interactions. Mrs. Padmaja, Principal, MES KK School, Malleswaram addressed the trainees with the topic- Teacher Motivation. Phonetics training session was conducted by Smt. Jyothi Manjunath, Head Mistress, MESKK Pre Primary School. These sessions were highly beneficial to the students.

Students visited MES KK Pre School on 22nd July 2024 and observed the classroom interactions.

Ms. Hemalatha, alumnus of M E S Teachers College trained students with stories and rhymes. Pre internship activities were held from 1st August to 4th August 2024. Students were oriented about domains of development, activities of preschool, literacy and numeracy, teaching learning materials, lesson plan writing and how to observe a class. Internship commenced on 5th August 2024 in MES Kishora Kendra Pre School. Students got the training under the guidance of experienced teachers. They acquired the skills of handling the children at foundational stage. Internal Assessment Test was conducted on 7th and 8th October 2024. Students attended the workshop on Learner Centric Strategies for Teaching-Learning in the context of NCF 2022 and Faculty Development Program on-Managing Discipline Problems in school children. Program was organized by Mysore Education Society in collaboration with Institute of Counselor Training, Research & Consultancy (ICTRC)

Students also participated in various competitions, Art and Craft workshop, theme based presentation on various topics.

Final Examination was held from 20th to 28th November 2024. Valedictory and convocation was conducted on 16/12/2024.

The ECCE program is delivered by the staff of MESTC.

5.4 Nobel Insight Lectures (NIL)

Nobel Insight Lecture series is an outreach programme initiated by the Management in 2017 and organised every year in the month of October / November, after the Nobel Prizes are announced. NIL 2024 was a collaborative effort of the Management, MES ACS Degree College and MES IOM. The lecture series began at MES ACS Degree College with a formal inauguration on 20th November, 2024.

This was followed by the lectures in Chemistry, Physiology/ Medicine, Literature, Economic Sciences, Physics on 20th, 25th, 28th, 29th of November 2024 and 2nd of December 2024 respectively, organized by MES ACS. The Nobel Insight lecture in Peace was organized by MES IOM, on 5th December 2024.

Experts from the respective fields were invited as resource persons and the sessions were moderated by a moderator/presiding guest. The lectures were well received by the students, research scholars, faculty and the public at large.

Both the degree colleges of MES, i.e. ACS & IOM, also conducted student centric activities like poster-making and collage designing, associated with the prize-winning area of research, in the relevant subjects. The valedictory programme of NIL 2024 lecture series was organised on 5th December 2024 at MES IOM.

NIL 2024 has realized its objective of creating awareness amongst the participants, regarding the winners of the Nobel prizes, the nature and significance of their work and future implications.

The compendium of NIL 2024 lecture series has been published in collaboration with M/s. Sapna Book House. Copies of the same have been distributed to all the MES institutions and stake holders of MES.

ICT support was provided to all MES Institutions. The investment was made for the purchase of Projectors, Canon Printer and Xerox Machine, Printers (including 3D Printer), Interactive Panels, Desktops, Laptops, Software Licenses, Digital Standee, Outdoor LED Panels, Canon camcorder, Camera, EPABX System, Biometric Devices, Firewall, Bar Code Printers and Scanners, Edchemy software for all institutions, Website photo shooting, AMC etc.

5.7.3 Distribution of cash awards to the toppers at the State/Board/University level examinations

Since **2018-19**, cash awards are being distributed to the toppers at the various State/Board-level examinations. In 2024-25, 21 students across three institutions were given cash awards amounting to Rs.1.38 lakh. Eleven students from MES KK, Malleswaram, five students in ACS PU College (Science-2, Commerce-3), five students of Degree College of ACS (B.A-4, B.Sc.-1) have won the cash awards.

5.7.4 Scholarships to the rank holders pursuing studies in MES institutions

As a best practice during admissions in order to encourage meritorious students to pursue studies in MES institutions, the management has been offering scholarships since **2017** to students who secure the top 20 positions at the State/Board level examinations. This scholarship is awarded to students from within MES, as also students from other institutions joining MES.

During 2024-25, **65** students were given scholarship totalling to **Rs.7.15 lakhs**. Out of these 65 students, 17 students joined ACS PU, 4 joined MPLPU, 5 joined BRS PU, 5 joined KKPU, 27 joined MES Degree College of ACS and 7 joined IOM.

As a new initiative, primarily to encourage students with high merit to join MES PU colleges, 239 students of SSLC/X standard examination of 2024-25 were given special incentive amounting to Rs. 12.48 lakhs. Of these, 108 students joined BRSPU, 19 joined ACSPU, 16 joined KKPU and 50 joined MPLPU College. In continuation, this initiative was extended to IOM from the year 2023-24. 46 students of high merit in II PU were given this special incentive.

Similarly, 93 students were given cash awards of Rs.500/- each, amounting to Rs. 46,500/- for topping the I PU examinations of 2024-25. Out of 93, 35 students are from ACSPU, 22 from KKPU, 16 from MPL PU and 20 are from BRS PU.

5.7.5 Group Personal Accident Insurance

MES subscribes to Group Insurance Policy with HDFC ERGO General Insurance to provide various benefits under personal accident scheme. This covers all the students and one earning parent/guardian of the student. It also includes all the regular teaching and non-teaching staff of the schools and colleges. An amount Rs.2.86 lakh was paid as premium covering the period from 16.04.2024 to 15.04.2025.

There was 1 claim of Rs. 5000 by a staff of MES KK School.

5.8 Staff Welfare

MES has always been an enlightened and conscientious employer. The total outgo on establishments was Rs. 3092.71 lakhs which included salaries and other financial benefits on completion of probation, benefits under career progression (promotion to senior scales and selection grade) as per the Cadre & Recruitment Rules, 2017. This has been appreciated by all the employees.

5.8.1 Introduction of New pay scales

MES introduced revised pay scale for all its confirmed regular employees w.e.f. 01.07.2024. The pay scale was fixed on the minimum pay of the sixth pay commission of Government of Karnataka. In the new scale employees get Basic pay + 10% of Basic as HRA & a fixed TA of Rs. 500/-.

5.8.2 Revised Leave Rules

MES Service Rules & Revised Leaves Rules was adopted w.e.f. 01.04.2024 for all management employees covering all aspects like recruitment rules, leave rules, terms & conditions of service, code of conduct, disciplinary rules etc. The rules were adopted with effect from 01.04.2024

5.8.3 EL encashment

A new feature in revised leave rules w.e.f. 01.04.2024 was encashment of EL.

All regular confirmed employees are eligible for encashment of earned leave in excess of 90 days up to a maximum of 15 days in a calendar year by surrendering the Earned Leave. The employee shall have a balance of 25 days EL at credit. Employees retiring on superannuation can encash EL up to a maximum of 90 days at the time of retirement. 205 Employees on roll & 6 employees who superannuated availed the benefit. The total expenditure for EL encashment is Rs. 59.92 lakhs.

5.8.4 Group Health Insurance

MES continued to subscription to Group Health Insurance Policy with the New India Assurance Co. Ltd. during the year 2024-25 to provide various benefits under this scheme. All the regular / temporary teaching and non-teaching staff of the schools and colleges are covered under the policy. The maximum insurance cover for each insured person is Rs. 2.00 lakhs. An amount Rs.24.86 lakh was paid as premium covering 536 employees for the period from 25.01.2025 to 24.01.2026.

There were 18 cashless claims & 8 reimbursement claims totaling 26 claims, amounting to Rs. 17.32 lakhs.

5.8.5 Contribution towards Provident Fund and Employees State Insurance

Provident Fund is a post-retirement benefit as mandated under the Employees Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952. A total contribution of Rs. 104.48 lakhs was made during the year 2024-25 in respect of 480 employees including 21 employees retired/resigned during the year. The PF claims/settlement is done by the employee himself/herself online.

Only employees whose wages are less than Rs.21,000/- are covered under the ESI scheme, where the employer and the employee contribute to the scheme. Rs.1.19 lakhs was paid as employers' contribution towards ESI during the year. This enabled the employees to avail the benefits for ailments, maternity and injury while on duty.

5.8.6 Staff Group Gratuity Policy

MES has also subscribed to a Group Gratuity Policy with LIC covering 444 regular employees appointed by the Management. Twenty one employees (retired-5, resigned-16) received gratuity settlement totaling to Rs. 94.33 lakhs.

A premium of Rs. 4.44 lakhs was paid to the LIC Group Gratuity Trust Fund during the year 2024-25.

5.8.7 Ex-gratia payment to staff retired on superannuation.

The Management has been paying an ex-gratia amount of Rs.20,000/- to the grant-in-aid employees and Rs. 40,000/- to the employees appointed by the Management on their retirement. Under this scheme, six teaching and one non-teaching staff appointed by the Management who retired on superannuation have been paid Rs. 40,000/- each and two aided teaching staff have been paid Rs. 20,000/- during the year 2024-25.

The total amount paid is Rs. 3.20 lakhs.

5.8.8 Fee Concession to the children of staff at MES Institutions

Since 2002, the Management has been extending fee concession in the form of exemption from payment of Tuition Fee and Special Development Fee to one child (studying in any of the MES Institutions) of permanent employees appointed by the Management. This was revised in 2021 by limiting the concession amount to a lumpsum amount of Rs.20,000/-.

The matter was revisited in 2022 and the earlier policy of waiver in payment of Tuition Fee and Special Development Fee was retained only for children of non-teaching staff whereas for children of teaching staff concession of Rs. 20,000/- is continued.

95 children of staff members availed fee concessions amounting to Rs. 28.77 lakhs during 2024-25. Of these 71 children are from the two Schools, 15 from PU Colleges and 9 are from the two degree Colleges. Of these 52 are children of teaching staff and 43 are children of non-teaching staff.

5.8.9 Bank of Baroda Achievers Award

Bank of Baroda, Malleswaram Branch, came forward to felicitate student achievers pursuing their final year degree program at MES institutions as part of their CSR initiatives.

The Bank offered three awards:

- > Academic Achiever
- > Sports Achiever
- > Best All Rounder

Three degree students (two from MES ACS & one from MES IOM) were awarded with a memento, certificate of appreciation & a cash award of Rs. 1.00 lakh (shared amongst the three students) in a formal function conducted on 11th February 2025 at MES ACS Degree College.

5.9 Human Resources

A total of 491 (333 teaching, 105 non-teaching and 53 (Temporary Full Time / Guest Faculty / Part Time teachers) staff from all the institutions were on roll during 2024-25.

5.10 Administrative initiatives

5.10.1 GreytHR Payroll Package

(i) M/s. Greytip software Pvt Ltd., payroll online package system was introduced for the preparation of monthly salary from the financial year 2023-24, as a pilot project across MES Institutions. Towards this, identity code numbers of the employees with the data were uploaded onto the online package system.

From the FY 2024-25, the complete processing of monthly payroll & auto pay slip generation as well as customized pay register, is being implemented through this online package.

This payroll package comes with the feature of **Employee Self Service (ESS)** Web & Mobile application. This enables the employee to view the pay slips, leave credits, apply for leave etc.,

(ii) Manager/Principals Self Service (MSS)

This feature can be operated by the Principals & Managers, in order to view the leave balances / credits of the employees, in the event of leave sanctioning. As a pilot trial, the MSS feature was rolled out in the Management Office, from January 2025 onwards. As this feature is very user friendly & successful, the same is now extended to the Principals of all the Institutions.

5.10.2 Fixed Asset Management System

Data Uploading of the Fixed Assets has been completed, for the two schools and four PU Colleges, one degree college. In KK School, KKPU, ACS PU, MPL PU & IOM Colleges as a further step QR code is generated which is asset specific & the same is pasted on the asset.

Some of the issues were reported to the vendor and fixes are in progress.

5.10.3 Uniform

The uniforms for support staff was an administrative initiative from the year 2023-24. A total of 97 support staff are provided with uniforms, of two sets each. The expenditure was 1.87 lakhs. Washing allowance of Rs.250/- per staff, on monthly basis is also borne by the Management.

With deep anguish, MES pays homage to Late Smt. Vimala Rangachar, Late Sri Krishna Kumar S and Late Sri M L Srinath, all of them who served on the MES Management as Office Bearers and passed away during the year 2024-25.

Late Smt. Vimala Rangachar a founder member of MES, was with MES for over six decades (1958 to 2023) (President 2011 to 2017 & 2022 to 2023)

Late Sri Krishna Kumar S, former President of MES served MES for 18 years (2007-2025) (President from 11.10.2017 to 28.09.2022)

Late Sri M L Srinath, was with MES for 31 years (1994-2025) and served as the Treasurer of MES. (Treasurer from 22.03.1998 to 14.09.2012)

MES also pays tribute to Late Smt. Prathibha K.N., a teacher in the Physics Department of ACS Degree College, who passed away on 23-02-2025.

5.11.2 Best Teacher Award

Smt. Vinoda Surendranath, wife of our former President, Late Sri K.P. Surendranath has instituted an annual 'Best Teacher' Award in his memory. This award is presented to the 'Best Teacher' from pre-primary, primary & high school sections, separately, on rotation, each year.

As a first time initiative, MES felicitated the outstanding performance of students in State, National & International level sports & games events in a formal function, on 16th January 2025. A total of 136 students across all the 8 institutions of MES were honoured by the MES Management. The expenditure was 1.38 lakhs. Student achievers were awarded with a memento & certificate of appreciation.

5.11.5 Felicitation to the Top 20 Rank holders of SSLC / PUC / Degree / PG

The year 2024-25 has seen excellent performance by our students. There are several rank holders in top 20 position in the board / university examination.

A total of 80 students who were the toppers in the board / university examination of 2024-25 were felicitated on 6th June 2025. Out of these 80 students there were 25 students from MES KK School, Malleswaram 36 from MES ACS PU College, 9 students from MES KK PU College, 2 students from MES MPL PU College, 2 students from MES BRS PU College and 6 students from MES College of ACS. The total expenditure for the program was 1.07 lakhs.

5.11.6 Felicitation to retired Staff

One of the Best Practices of the MES Management is to acknowledge the services of staff members, both teaching and non-teaching who have worked in the various Institutions of MES.

Every year, a get-together of all the employees of MES, along with the family members of the retired staff is arranged. In this programme the staff members who have attained superannuation are felicitated. Each retired staff member is presented with a "personalized memento" and honoured by the Office Bearers, Managing Committee members & members of MES.


